Parent Transition Planner - Jargon Buster and Glossary

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Bexley	Voice

Annual Review	The review of an EHC plan which the local authority must make as a minimum every 12 months. The Annual Review Meeting is an important meeting and includes the YP, parent/carer and all professionals involved
	with the YP.
CAMHS	Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services. These services assess and treat children and young people with emotional, behavioural or mental health difficulties. They range from basic pastoral care to specialist 'Tier 4' CAMHS, which provide in-patient care for those who are severely mentally ill.
Capacity	Mental capacity means being able to understand information given about a particular decision, being able to communicate their decision and to retain that information long enough to be able to make the decision. If a YP is lacking capacity because of an illness or disability such as a mental health problem or a learning disability, the carer may need guidance under the Mental Capacity Act.
Care Plan	A record of the health and/or social care services that are being provided to a child or young person to help them manage a disability or health condition. The Plan will be agreed with the young person and may be contained within a patient's medical record. Care Plans are also maintained by local authorities for looked after children.
Code of Practice (CoP)	Government guidance on the duties of local authorities, schools, colleges, health services and others who support children and young people with special educational needs (SEN).
Connexions	A service providing a single point of access for all 13-19 year olds to help
Service	them prepare for the transition to work/college and into adult life.
Direct payments	A cash payment given to a parent, young person or someone on their behalf so that they can arrange the support detailed in an EHC plan.
Disability	A mental or physical impairment which strongly affects a person's ability to carry out normal daily activities. Many people with a disability will also have a SEN.
Education	A general phrase to describe a place where a young person receives their
setting	education, for example a school or college.
Education,	A formal assessment carried out by a local authority to decide how much
Health and Care	extra support a child or young person needs.
Needs	Sometimes referred to as a Statutory Assessment. It can be requested by
Assessment	the parent, carer or educational setting.
EHC Plan	Education, Health and Social Care EHC Plan is a legal document issued by the local authority describing a child or young person's e ducation, h ealth and social c are needs and the support that will be given to them.
Further Education (FE)	The FE sector in England includes further education colleges, sixth form colleges, specialist colleges and adult education institutes. It does not include universities.
Health provision	The medical care or support set out in an EHC plan. This could include medication, nursing or special equipment.
Higher Education /Employment	Includes exploring different employment options, such as support for becoming self-employed and help from supported employment agencies.
Independent living	Young people having choice, control and freedom over their lives and the support they have for their accommodation and living.
Local Authority (LA)	A local authority in England.

LD Assessment	A learning difficulty assessment under (section 139A Learning and Skills Act 2000) of needs carried out before a YP with SEN moves from school to further education.
Local Offer (LO)	Local information published by the LA about the education, health and social care support available for children and young people with SEN and disabilities, age 0-25.
Mediation	A method of seeking to resolve disagreements by going to an independent mediator. Mediation is not compulsory for the parent or YP but they may need to consider mediation before appealing the education parts of an EHC plan.
Meeting Reports	Written reports from parents, teachers and other professionals on a pupil's special educational needs.
Outcome Focus	The benefit or difference that a particular bit of help makes to a child or YP.

Parent Carer Forum	A Parent Carer Forum (PCF) is a group of parents and carers of disabled children and YP age 0-25, who work with LA's, education, health and other

Personalisation	Personalisation means ensuring services are designed and delivered around

Personal Health	A personal health budget is used for NHS healthcare and support needs.

	that it is for most people of their age.
SEN Support	The first level of additional support in education settings for Children and YP
	with SEN. It replaced school action/action plus in September 2014.

Social care	The support that someone receives to help them at home or in the

Transfer Review	A process carried out by the local authority to transfer a statement of		
	education into an EHC plan.		
Young Person (YP)	A child becomes a young person when they have reached the end of compulsory schooling. A young person between 16 and 25 has the right to make their own decisions related to their EHC plan.		
Transition	Moving from one stage to another in a child or young person's life. For example – primary/secondary or child/adult services.		
Transition Plan	A plan drawn up after the Year 9 Annual Review of a Statement to draw together information from a range of individuals within and beyond the school to plan for the young person's transition to adult life.
